

Reducing System Gaps

→ Promote cross-system collaboration to improve how the justice system handles domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking cases.

### What is a specialized DV court?

- ➤ Separate docket with DV cases
- ➤ Designated judge or judges hearing the cases
- ➤ Designated court staff
- Separate safety measures in place for victims and linkages to services, advocates
- Accountability measures for offenders to ensure compliance and linkages to service interventions
- ➤ Specialized training for all staff on dynamics of DV
- ➤ Regular and ongoing meetings with community partners and system stakeholders

# Ways to use STOP Grant Funds for DV Courts

- ➤ New staff paid originally through grant funds and later institutionalized by the court system
  - > Resource coordinator
  - > Defendant monitors
- ➤ Staff for Partners paid originally through grant funds and then either absorbed by agency or other sustainability methods
  - ➤ Victim Advocates

### Domestic Violence Courts Today

- ➤ Approximately 300+ domestic violence courts in the United States
- ➤ Represents over 27 states
- ➤ More than 50 domestic violence courts internationally
- >A diversity of models, policies and practices



#### Domestic Violence Courts Promote

- ➤ An engaged judiciary
- Coordination between courts as well as stakeholders
- >Improved victim safety for petitioners/children
- ➤ Identifying offender risk and needs
- Improved information sharing between agencies where appropriate
- > Evaluation and research

#### What are Domestic Violence Court Goals?

# Components to Consider in a DV Response

#### **Victim safety and Services**

- ➤ Courthouse safety
- >Access to victim advocates
- >Attention to safety plans
  - Nexus to risk and lethality assessments
- ➤ Plan for firearms and their role in orders of protection

#### **Offender Accountability**

- ➤ Broad use of:
  - > Risk assessment
  - Probation and judicial monitoring
  - Compliance reviews

# Components to Consider: Informed Decision-Making

- ➤ History of violence
- ➤ Weapons check
- > Ask about children
- ➤ Pre-sentence report from probation

- **▶** Post-disposition
  - Defendant assessment and placement
  - ➤On-going monitoring
  - ➤ Intensive supervision
  - ➤ Information on compliance
  - ➤ Probation Officer in court

- Risk-Need-Responsivity (RNR)
- ➤ Civil/Criminal Coordination
- ➤ Impact on Kids

## Idaho's STOP funding

- ➤ Idaho applies and receives STOP funding annually
- >5% court set-aside
- ► 18% discretionary

# Idaho Projects funded with STOP funds

- ➤ Statewide DV Coordinator &/or assistant at AOC
- >Translation of Civil Protection Order forms
- ➤ Interpreter services for Civil Protection Orders
- ➤ Printing Civil Protection Order Benchcards

### Using STOP funds for Training

- Annual judicial training (dv, sexual assault, stalking)
- ➤ Out of state judicial training (Enhancing Skills in DV cases)
- ➤ DV Court Conference (judges and DVC teams)
- ➤ Other court personnel training (clerks, Family Court)
- In-state training through the Idaho Council or Idaho Coalition
- Stakeholder/community training (attorneys, law enforcement, evaluators, providers)
- ➤ Statewide interpreter training (NCSC)
